Ford May Buy and Operate 400 Government Ships

Buffalo, May 13.—Henry Ford may buy a large section of the United States Shipping Board fleet of unused vessels and by operating them under private ownership send the American merchant marine flag into every port in the world.

"It is true I talked to Mr. Ford, but I cannot say what the scope of the plans under consideration are or what is to become of the rest of the Shipping Board vessels," said T. V. O'Connor chairman of the Shipping Board, tonight, following his arrival in Buffalo on the new passenger steamer Greater Buffalo.

However, it was learned that should the plan discussed work out, Ford will buy many, maybe hundreds, of the best of the Shipping Board's ocean steamers. It would relieve the Shipping Board of its concern about the use of the 900

ships now rotting at their moorings and make an American-owned and privately operated merchant marine a certainty.

New York, May 13.—Five more padlocks, two outside New York city, today were ordered placed on doors which federal authorities charged had sheltered liquor violations.

Batavia's Wizard Williams Is Again Indicted

Batavia, N. Y., May 13.—Two new indictments against M. Earl Williams, Batavia's purported financial wizard, returned sealed recently by the Genesee county grand jury, were opened today. The indictments charge grand larceny of \$2,000 from C. J. and M. L. Buckenmyer of Alexander, and misappropriation of the same amount. District Attorney Albert J. Waterman said the new indictments had been sought because of the finding of a receipt, signed by Williams, and given to the Buckenmyers, for \$2,000 to be used in the purchase of Dairymen's League Co-operative association certificates.

Taxes on Autos, Jewelry and Theatre Are to Go

Washington, May 13.—A program of tax reduction totaling \$400,000,000 that would remain in force throughout the present administration was laid before President Coolidge today by Representative Bacharach of New Jersey, member of the ways and means committee.

1. Elimination of taxes on automobiles and accessories, motorboats, jewelry and club dues; a reduction of approximately \$150,000,000.
2. Modification of amusement tax so as to apply only on admission above \$1.50; a cut of about \$30,000,000.
3. Reductions of the inheritance tax to a maximum of 20 per cent. the minimum rate to begin at \$100,000; a reduction of \$50,000,000. A similar cut on gift taxes, amounting to \$5,000,000.
