Three Mile Bay.

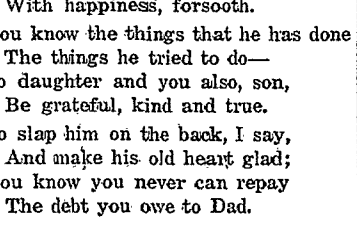

SEEKS TO RECOVER \$115,315.88 FOR LOSS OF HIS CHEESE STORAGE PLANT.

Changing fraud in the appraisal of the big cheese storage plant at Cape Vincent, which was destroyed by fire April 23, 1921, the eleven actions brought by E. W. Coon through attorneys Cobb, Cosgrove & Kimball, of Watertown against the Phoenix Insurance company, the National Fire Insurance company, of Hartford; the Franklin Fire Insurance company, of Philadelphia; the Camden Fire Insurance company, of Camden; the Fidelity Phoenix Fire Insurance company, of New York; the National Liberty Insurance company, of America; and the Globe Insurance company to recover \$115,315.88, the amount of the loss claimed, are on the calendar for trial at the special term of supreme court, which will convene in Watertown November 8. . . .

SEAPLANE NIAGARA LANDS AT THE CAPE

MACHINE WAS EN ROUTE FROM CLEVELAND TO MIAMI, FLORIDA.

The seaplane Niagara, enroute from Cleveland, Ohio, to Miami, Florida, was forced to land at the Cape last Thursday afternoon on account of a shortage of gas. The craft, which had been at Sodus bay for a number of days on account of bad weather, had been reported missing, and dispatches expressed fear for the safety of the crew, as nothing had been heard from it since leaving Cleveland on October 21, with the larger seaplanes Buckeye and Nina, en route to Miami, Fla., carrying passengers who will spend the winter in the south. . . .
