MRS. ROBERT CREIGHTON

The funeral services of Mrs. Robert Creighton who died Friday morning July 6th, were held from her late home in Dekalb Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock Rev. Mr. Robson Methodist pastor of Rensselaer Falls officiating. Mr. Robson spoke from the text found in Rev. 22nd chapter, 7 and 12 verses. "Behold I come quickly". Interment in our Heuvelton cemetery.

Mrs. Creighton retired after enjoying the fire works the night of the Fourth in her usual state of health, but was found by her husband Thursday morning in an unconscious condition having suffered a stroke of apoplexy during the night; she did not regain consciousness and passed away Friday morning. She is survived by five children three daughters and two sons. Mrs. Andrew Hitchcock of Dekalb; Mrs. Thomas Dickinson of Moore's Junction; Mrs. Tennis Tillma of Fremont Nebraska. Sons, John and Frank Creighton of this village and her husband Robert Creighton.

Mrs. Creighton was a life long member of the Methodist church a devout christian, loving wife and mother. She ate not the "bread of Idleness" but was ever alert and active even beyond her strength.

Her death came as a great shock to her friends, neighbors, children, and feeble husband who is left thus at the twilight hour in his infirmity without his companion of nearly sixty years. She was 78 years of age but active and much alive to the things of this world; but the summons came from which there was no delaying.

And this aged husband waiting as it were at the shore in the eventide can feel he is "Only waiting till the shadows are a little longer grown only waiting till the glimmer of the day's last beam has flown; Then from out the gathered darkness, Holy deathless stars shall rise.

By whose light my soul shall gladly Tread its pathway to the skies."
