SCHOOL ELECTIONS

For the first time in several years, the qualified voters of Lackawanna will be called upon to cast ballots for the extremely important positions of school trustees. The election for school board members is scheduled for July 8. In the meantime, every voter should register either Thursday or Friday of this week or on the same days next week in order to qualify for the privilege of voting. Registrations are scheduled to take place between the hours of 11 a.m. and 8 p.m. at the Lackawanna High School.

There will be four vacancies to fill on the Board of Education. As usual, there is a bumper crop of hopeful candidates. To insure a smooth functioning, well-balanced

educational system for the city of Lackawanna, it is imperative that the citizens of our community select men who are qualified to serve on such a Board by reason of their educational background, interest in the welfare of our children, and their ability not only to maintain present high standards but to surpass them.

It would be in the best interests of our community, if before we cast our ballots on July 8, we carefully analyzed the qualifications of all the candidates. Let us not be swayed by political considerations but rather by the calibre of the candidates. Then and then only will we have a Board of Education that will be interested primarily in our children.

THANKLESS JOB

The Charter Commission appointed by Mayor Michael J. Hughes to write a new charter to be presented to the voters at the elections in 1948 are busily engaged in their work but find that the citizens of Lackawanna do not show much interest. Members decided to hold meetings twice a month to give all organizations an opportunity to voice their opinions upon the matter. To date, the response to invitations has been poor.

Monday night, a meeting was held to which all veterans organizations and even individual veterans were invited to express themselves. Not one veteran showed up. This is indeed a strange situation, especially since it was a group of veterans who first started the movement for the charter.

The charter committee members should not be forced to give up precious time for which they receive nothing in order to do all the work themselves. This is even more true when one considers that all their work may be thrown out by the votes of the very ones who showed no interest in the work.

ity to defend themselves. They also charged that Mr. Woodyard then chose his own slate of deacons and ordained them privately, which is contrary to church practice.

In turn, the minister related how he raised funds and built the church almost single handed in 1942. He claimed he worked for days and days on the church while the men bringing the suit passed by without doing a bit. While doing this work, his trouble with the deacons started. "One day I was working on the scaffold when William Lain came into the church roaring like a lion," the minister related. "He said I called him a liar. I denied it but Lain told me to come down and shoot it out, or cut it out, with him. I went down to face him and he lost his nerve. There was trouble ever after."

At the annual meeting of the church called in January, "they started rough-house all of a sudden," Mr. Woodyard declared. "We had to call the law. We called the police, the sheriff, and the Detective Bureau. But even then we had to disband the meeting."
