KC PARTY DRAWS RECORD CROWD AT SOUTH SHORE

Schwed Wins Knights of Columbus Golf Championship by Defeating O'Neil, 1 up.

Sunday afternoon the largest crowd ever to attend a picnic at the South Shore Golf Club converged on that spot. The occasion was the Knights of Columbus annual Workers Party, a means by which the local council honors those who use so much time and effort to make the annual lawn fete a success.

Close to three hundred persons were in attendance and spent the day participating in various games and amusements. Putting contests and horse-shoe pitching were very popular, but the outstanding event of the day was the finals in the annual Knights of Columbus Golf Tournament.

After five weeks of closely fought elimination contests, Joseph Schwed emerged as the victor in Sunday's contest. He defeated John O'Neil, one up in 19 holes. His score was 77. O'Neil had an 80. Previously, in the semi-finals, Schwed had defeated Pat. Lally, also 1 up in 19 holes, and O'Neil had defeated Jim Downey, 2-1. Altogether, 32 players had qualified in the qualifying round, forcing Schwed to play championship golf all along to survive.

At the banquet held in the evening, John Toole, chairman of the golf tournament, presented Mr. Schwed with the Knights of Columbus Trophy, emblematic of his being champion of the council for 1947.

THREE MAJORS NAMED TO HEAD COMMUNITY CHEST CAMPAIGN DIVISIONS

Agencies Which Benefit Lackawanna Residents Are Listed; Active Campaign Organization Being Formed.

Julius Boda, chairman of District J (Lackawanna) in the 1947 Community Chest Campaign which will be conducted from October 6 to the 22nd, recently announced the appointment of three majors who will head the three main sections in the drive for funds to support 40 Community Chest Agencies.

New Firemen Appointed

Although it has not been officially announced, two new firemen have been appointed by Mayor Michael J. Hughes and the Lackawanna Civil Service Commission. The appointments are Donald Burke and V. Beres. James Stephens, one of the firemen appointed when the three platoon system went into effect last January, has left his job to enter the navy.

Major of the business and industry organization is Jacob Weinstein, 154 Ridge Rd., prominent local businessman. Major of the residential section is Mrs. Joseph F. Schwed, 16 Fisher Rd., who successfully headed the Women's Division two years ago in the Community Chest Campaign, and the Major of the Public Employes and Organizations is William A. Sari, 662 Ridge Rd., prominent local attorney who directed the same division last year.

Mr. Weinstein, Mrs. Schwed and Mr. Sari are now busy building up their respective sections with volunteer workers. They will name shortly seven captains who will assist them in the task of organizing strong units in the forthcoming campaign.

40 Agencies—1 Campaign

Among the 40 agencies which benefit from this one consolidated campaign, are the following which are of benefit to the people of Lackawanna:

The Lackawanna Charity Organization Society, 33-37 Wilkesbarre Ave., is a private organization, non-sectarian, which was established in 1910 and incorporated in 1919. The president of the organization is Dr. John D. Fadale, while the Executive Secretary is Miss Grace M. Laing. The total budget for 1946 was \$9,411 of which \$9,224 was received from the Community Chest. Its function—In cooperation with other public and private social agencies, helps bring about individual and family adjustments. A friendly center where the people of Lackawanna can feel free to come for information, advice and help regarding their family problems.
