

# \$4 Million Allocated For Southtowns Highway Work

Congressman Jack Kemp announced this week that Secretary of Transportation Drew Lewis has decided to allocate \$4 million in funds for the Rice Road Interchange project in the Southtowns.

"I am delighted that this vital funding has been allocated for the Rice Road Interchange, which is so crucial for economic development in the Southtowns and Western New York. This is a giant step forward in our six-year effort to have the project become an integral part of the federal government's transportation priorities. I am proud to have been in a position to speed up the funding," Kemp said.

Kemp was personally notified of the decision in a phone call from Secretary Lewis, who also sent the following letter, which reads in part, "Dear Jack: Following up on our conversation of Oct. 22, I am pleased to confirm that we are allocating \$4 million in discretionary priority primary funds to the New York State Department of Transportation (NYSDOT). This allocation is for work on U.S. 219 and is in addition to \$47.2 million in discretionary priority primary funds previously made available to the state for work on the route. The Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) is advising NYSDOT officials that this allocation may be used to finance the Rice Hill Road project if the state so elects. I can assure you the FHWA will cooperate fully with NYSDOT officials as they use this discretionary funding. I appreciate knowing of your continued personal interest in this very important project."

The construction of the Rice Road Interchange is an element extremely important to the Western New York economy. It will provide easy access to several local ski resorts, including Kissing Bridge in Colden, which until now have been bypassed for other areas with ready access. It will provide a necessary route for the truck farmers in Eden, and is part of the master plan the Town of Boston has for the development

of light industry. The Rice Road Interchange is also much needed for safety reasons; at this point, drivers are required to take a dangerous detour through the town of about eight miles, and the detour has required the deployment of all the town's emergency services.

## Veterans Day Mass and Service

The Erie County American Legion will honor all veterans, living and deceased, with a Mass on Sunday, Nov. 7, at St. Joseph's Cathedral, 50 Franklin St., at 11 a.m. Gold Star Mothers and the Ladies Auxiliary will be guests of the Legionnaires in celebrating the Mass. The chairman, Henry Kedzierski, is hoping to have an outstanding crowd this year, as a new section honoring deceased comrades of all wars has been added.

This year's new program will be after the Mass. The group will march to the Buffalo Naval Park, after which there will be a brief service commemorating all departed comrades. The Gold Star Mothers will participate in a wreath ceremony and "Taps" and a gun salute will be sounded.

Mr. Kedzierski's co-chairmen, American Legion service officer and past district commander, John J. Glegota Jr., and past Erie County commander, Edward Kokoszka, will assist in running this new program.

"We in the American Legion have a tradition of more than 60 years of holding church services each Veterans Day in honor of Gold Star Mothers of Erie County and in memory of our departed who have served our country," said Daniel Tenerowicz, publicity chairman.

Erie County Commander Jack L. Keller invites all residents of Buffalo and Erie County to "join us in properly remembering our departed comrades."

## Sheriff Card Updated To Fit New Law

Erie County Sheriff Kenneth J. Braun has announced the implementation of an updated Erie County Sheriff's Department Personal Identification Card System. The new card was designed to identify the 19th birthday of card holders. Sheriff's Cards are used by various individuals as personal identification. They are becoming increasingly popular among senior citizens.

Sheriff Braun proclaimed the change is due to state law which requires a person to be 19 years of age to purchase alcoholic beverages as of Dec. 4, 1982. Some important changes to notice on the card are as follows:

- a) Background behind portrait is now gray.
- b) A fingerprint on the front of the card.

c) Card holder's 19th birthday will be displayed in red on the rear of the card.

The Erie County Sheriff's Department will still issue cards to 18-year-olds as a form of personal identification, with the date of the 19th birthday appearing on the rear of the card. New Sheriff's Cards are designed to deter alteration and forgery.

Sheriff Braun expresses a great concern for the community to recognize the Sheriff's Card changes and to avoid the selling of alcohol to minors. This new system should go a long way toward reducing any fraudulent use of Sheriff's Identification Cards.
