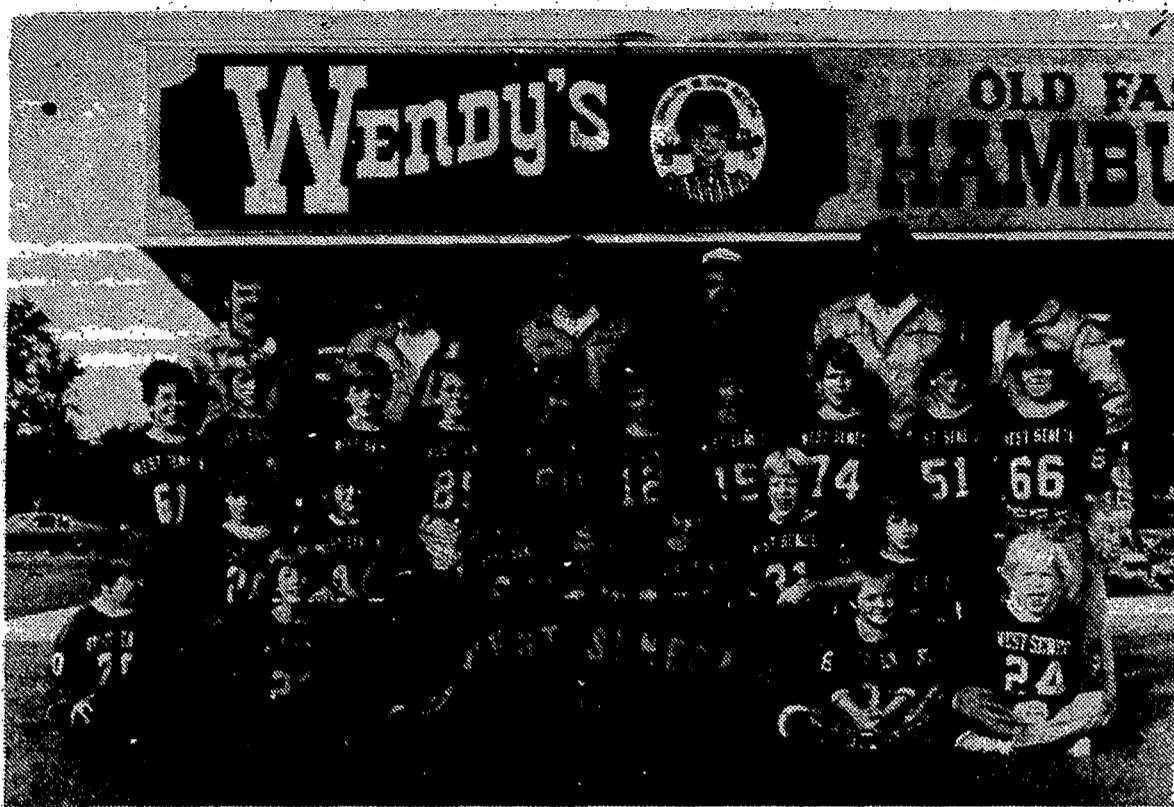

Marty Bressor Leads Indians to Playoffs

Led by Erie County's top scorer, the West Seneca West Indians soccer team plays their first playoff game against Kenmore West this Wednesday.

The Indians, led by Senior Marty Bressor won 11 games, tied two, and lost five this year.

Bressor, a team's worth of goals himself, scored 30 goals and collected seven assists to lead the county in scoring.

Indians Coach Tom Whieldon said that Bressor is one of the most intense players he has ever seen.

"When he's out there, we can't even talk to him from the sidelines," Whieldon said.

"He is always thinking of the next play, always trying to figure out where the ball will go next," he said.

Coach Whieldon said that most of the time, Bressor is right, and when he is right, he is always on target with his shot.

"He is always where the next shot on goal will come from,"

Coach Whieldon said, "and he likes to intimidate goalies with his hard, rifle-fast shot."

Coach Whieldon said that Bressor has a shot like a cannon, and an aim that is always "right on target".

"He intimidates goalies by waiting until the last possible moment," Whieldon said, "and then he gives them a shot so powerful and strong that many of the goaltenders have a hard time handling it."

Bressor scores at a pace of almost two goals a game, and most teams average that many goals a game.

Coach Whieldon said that the county all-star team should be announced next week, and when it is, Marty Bressor has a sure shot at making the team.

The playoffs will be a single elimination tournament. A team continues playing as long as it keeps winning Coach Whieldon said.

The championship will be decided sometime around the week of Thanksgiving, he said.

West Seneca East on Verge Of Playoff Berth

Once again, it has come down to the last week of the season to determine a winner in the Section IV Federation Division II football crown.

Last year's victor, West Seneca East, can retain the title if they perform as they did last weekend against crosstown rival West Seneca West, and get a little help from Orchard Park or Amherst.

Going into the last week, East is in a three-way tie with Hamburg and Clarence, but it won't be as easy as going out and winning the last game, and hoping for a loss by the other clubs.

A tie-breaking points-against rule is in effect to determine this year's division champion. Currently, Hamburg leads the division with 35 points scored against them. East trails with 56, and Clarence has 57.

"There are several possibilities, but our first priority is to beat Frontier," East Coach Chuck Amo said.

"A shutout is a must," he said.

A shutout would keep East close in the points-against race.

The next step is to hope Hamburg gives up more than 21 points to Orchard Park on Friday night.

"That's the thing about this division, it's always up in the air as to who will win it all," Amo said.

"Our chances are as good as Clarence's or Hamburg's," he said.

With a sound performance by the whole squad against West last week, Coach Amo couldn't single out any players, and he

hopes the team can provide the same enthusiasm this week at Frontier.

The defense came up with four interceptions, one returned for a touchdown, and held West to a -34 yards rushing.

"It was a total team effort," Amo said.

"We shut down their running game and our linebackers came up with eight sacks on Santiago (West's quarterback)."

Fullback Keith Mason had another strong game with 82 yards rushing on 16 carries, including a touchdown.

Mike Morrow made a dazzling catch for a touchdown that covered 68 yards; as the offense rolled up 203 total yards to West's 51.

The inter-division contest had no bearing on East's chances for a Division II crown, only the bragging rights to West Seneca football.

Coach Amo expressed his thanks to all who have supported the team and hoped to see a good turnout at Rich Stadium to cheer on the Trojans.

Game time at Frontier is 2 p.m. on Saturday.
