RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR REMOVAL OF GARBAGE

- 1—Collections will be made each week.
- 2—Garbage includes ashes and household refuse.
- 3—No receptacle shall be over three (3) cubic feet in capacity.
- 4—All receptacles shall be placed near rear or side of house.
- 5—No garbage receptacles shall be placed on the street or sidewalk.
- 6—Receptacles shall be limited to two to each family.
- 7—Garbage will not be removed from cellars or outhouses.
- 8—All receptacles shall be covered.
