While this opinion, if correctly quoted, was wrong in the main, yet he appreciated the peculiar soil conditions of our village, which are confirmed now by Mr. Taylor's article.

Would it not be well to use Mr. Taylor's knowledge thru asking his advice or securing his service, if possible in the conservation of our trees?

A STEP IN THE RIGHT DIRECTION

The nomination of Argyle Parsons by the Democratic Party for Supervisor of the Town of Hempstead is to the credit of that organization.
