BRITONS SAVED NEUFELD AND CALL HIM INGRATE.

It is reported that a prominent part in the attempt made by the enemy to influence Mohammedan sentiment against the allies has been played by Karl Neufeld, the well known German eastern trader and traveler. Neufeld is indebted for his life to Lord Kitchener and the British troops who, under his command, overthrew the khalfis at Omdurman in September, 1898, say the British. Neufeld is alleged to have returned eventually to Berlin with a mass of useful information and a flask of miraculous water, which Arab admirers had sent to Field-Marshal von Hindenburg as a curative for his gout. The "miraculous water" preferred to be, probably, water from the famous well Zem-Zem at Mecca, which is held locally to be of miraculous origin.

SPEECH

of
HON. J. HAMPTON MOORE,
OF PENNSYLVANIA.

In The House of Representatives
Thursday, December 16, 1915.

The House in Committee of the Whole House on the state of the Union had under consideration the joint resolution (H. J. Res. 59) extending the provisions of the act entitled "An act to increase the internal revenue, and for other purposes," approved October 22, 1914, to December 31, 1916.

Mr. Fordney. Mr. Chairman, I yield 10 minutes to the gentleman from Pennsylvania (Mr. Moore).

Mr. Moore, of Pennsylvania. Mr. Chairman, as I shall not be able to say what I desire in 10 minutes, I ask unanimous consent to extend my remarks in the Record.

The chairman. Is there objection?

There was no objection.

Mr. Moore, of Pennsylvania. Mr. Chairman, if I were a cartoonist I would draw two pictures which I think would adequately describe the predicament in which the Democratic Party finds itself on the revenue question. First, I would depict a happy home in the country, labeled "1912", with everything bright and cheerful and the children jumping into the family wagon on their way to school. I would have the young teacher, who had just arrived from the city, offer his services as driver, with a query floating up from the old farmer as to whether he knew how to drive, and a monosyllabic "Sure" emerging from the lips of the theoretical young man. In the second picture, labeled "1915", I would have the farmer and his friends rushing to the scene of a disaster along the roadside, where the horse, wagon,

HUSBAND ENTITLED TO HALF

Court Decides Wife Must Divide Money She Saved From Household Expenses.

New York, Jan. 21.—Vice Chancellor Stevens in Jersey City has decided that James W. Donnelly, a Pennsylvania railroad engineer, living at No. 71 Baldwin avenue, is entitled to one-half of the money which his wife has saved out of that part of his salary which he has always given for household expenses.

Mrs. Donnelly deposited in her own name \$12,000 in a bank, placed \$7,000 on a mortgage and paid for the Donnelly home.

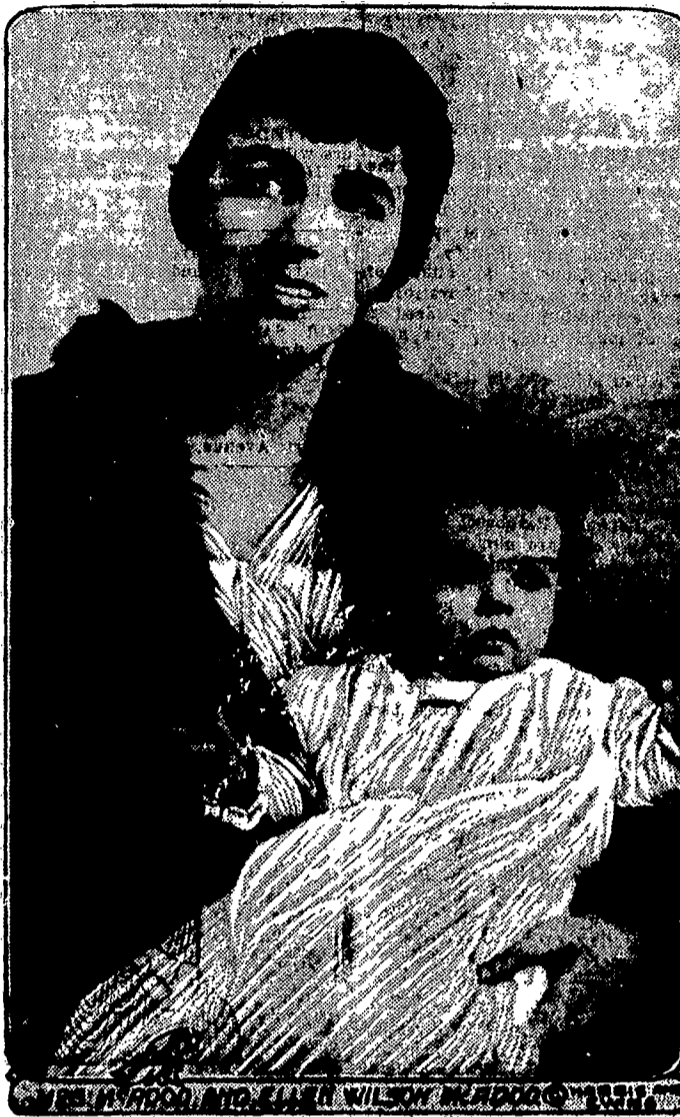

WANT UNIVERSAL MILITARY SERVICE

Only Solution of Defense Problem, Say Advocates of Preparedness.

BRYAN AND KITCHIN DENOUNCED

Demand Was Formulated in a Letter From Roosevelt and by Several Distinguished Speakers Who Discussed Various Phases of Problem at National Security League Meeting.

Washington, Jan. 21.—A demand for universal military service as the only solution of the national defense problem was made the rallying cry of advocates of national preparedness and amalgamated under the leadership of the National Security League. The demand was formulated in a letter from Colonel Theodore Roosevelt and by several distinguished speakers who discussed various phases of the problem.
Colonel Roosevelt characterized the continental army plan proposed by the administration as a sham and inefficient rival of the National Guard.
Frederick R. Coudert of New York decried the efforts of the pacifists as an attempt to Chinify the United States and drew upon the European war for illustration to show that the days of the professional army were over.
By implication and direct reference, William J. Bryan and the majority leader of the house of representatives, Mr. Kitchin, were denounced for their opposition to the preparedness program of President Wilson.
In his address opening the congress, S. Stanwood Monken, of New York referred to the "notorious inability" of the "Commoner" for direct or hard thinking on any grave matter. Secretary Daniel's naval policy was described as weak and ineffective.
These sallies brought forth sustained applause from the thousand or more delegates present on the opening day of the congress and the day.

VILLA IS CAPTURED BY CARRANZISTAS

Rebel Leader to Be Executed at Juarez Race Track.

WAS CAUGHT IN MOUNTAINS.

Messages From Chihuahua City, Confirming Reports of Capture of Villa, Say That Number of Bandits Who Participated in Santa Ysabel Massacre, Will Also Be Captured.

El Paso, Tex., Jan. 21.—Francisco Villa has been captured at Hacienda Geronimo by Carranza forces under General Gavazos, according to a private telegram from Chihuahua City, received here.

The telegram came from the source that first reported the massacres of Americans at Santa Ysabel.

Gavazos was last reported as bringing prisoners from Guerrero to Chihuahua City.

Reports of Capture Confirmed.

Messages from Chihuahua City confirming reports of the capture of Villa stated that a number of bandits who participated in the Santa Ysabel massacre were also captured and are being brought to Chihuahua City for execution.

Carranza Consul Garcia explained that his confirmation of the report of the capture of Villa was based on unofficial but reliable information.

He telegraphed at once to Chihuahua City asking immediately official information from General Jacinto Trevino, the military chief of the northern states.

At the same time a message was prepared to be filed in the event of formal information, requesting that Villa be sent to Juarez to be executed at the race track.

This message was written at the office of General Gabriel Gavira, commandant at Juarez, who said he had received nothing official concerning the capture of the outlaw chieftain.

Villa Caught in the Mountains.

Hacienda San Geronimo, where Villa is reported to have been taken, is on the boundary of the Hearst property, named the Babicora ranch, near the railroad station of San Thomas, southeast of Madera. Reports received here indicated that Villa had been hemmed in in a triangle formed in the mountains.

Colonel Maximiano Marquese was on the southwest point marching from Madero, Colonel Jose Alexondo was closing in from the northwest while General Gavazos advanced from the southeast.

Washington Without Definite News.

Washington, Jan. 21.—Confirmation was lacking at the state department late last night of reports from El Paso that General Francisco Villa had been captured by Carranza soldiers in northern Mexico and taken to Chihuahua City for execution.

SEARCH FOR SPY EVIDENCE

Police Scrutinize Books and Papers of Woman Who Suicided.

Wilkesbarre, Pa., Jan. 21.—Deputy Coroner Stanley Kurylosky and police authorities continue their search for evidence to substantiate their theory that Mrs. Marie Lehm, 40 years old, who committed suicide, may have been a spy of the German government.

The private books and papers of the woman were scrutinized. Letters were found from a woman in New York to whom \$45,000 was to be paid and there were certificates of withdrawal from the Excelsior Savings bank under date of June 2, 1915, for amounts of \$4,500 and \$2,500.

The woman's husband reiterated that she frequently had large sums of money and that she claimed to have sent it to England through a sea captain from New York.

SEEKS SENATORSHIP

Ohio Dairyman Says He'll Be Fifth Republican in Field.

Butler, O., Jan. 21.—E. E. Cassel, agriculturist and dairyman, announces he will be the fifth Republican candidate for United States senator. Mr. Cassel is a regular contributor to the Truth Teller and other farm papers.

With the exception of his platform for medical freedom, involving the removal of the cause of live stock troubles, and his bitter opposition to preparedness, he is in harmony with the other candidates.

WOMAN KILLS SELF AND TWO CHILDREN.

Triple Tragedy Shocks Little Town of Alloway.

Lyons, N. Y., Jan. 21.—Returning home to supper at 6 o'clock last evening, Edwin Payne of Alloway found the door of his home locked.

Looking through the living room windows, he discovered the bodies of his wife and two children hanging from the ceiling, pieces of clothesline suspending the bodies.

Breaking into the house, Payne found all were dead.

Mrs. Payne was 36 years old, the daughter four and the son two. The children were hanging with their backs to the mother.

The Paynes had been married six years. In a statement last night the husband and father says his wife had been acting strangely of late but bade him goodbye as usual when he left at 1 o'clock in the afternoon for work.

Three separate nooses were used to hang the woman and two children. All ropes were attached to the hanging lamp hook in the ceiling.

The children, physicians say, had been dead some time longer than the mother.

BAILEY TO HELP BUCHANAN

Ex-Texas Senator to Act As Attorney for Congressman Accused of Conspiracy.

New York, Jan. 21.—Ex-Senator Joseph A. Bailey of Texas, appeared before Judge Clayton in the United States district court as attorney for Congressman Frank Buchanan of Illinois, who was indicted with Franz Von Kumbel, the German agent; David Lamar, "the wolf of Wall street," and others connected with Labor National Peace Council, who are charged with conspiring to violate the Sherman law by calling strikes among munition workers.

Senator Bailey told the judge that he was not inclined to obstruct the case by raising the question of Buchanan's possible exemption from prosecution as a member of congress. The attorney, however, wanted six weeks to examine the indictment before allowing his client to enter a final plea.

Judge Clayton was inclined to demur to this motion, but instructed Senator Bailey to consult with United States Attorney Marshall about the matter. After seeing the federal prosecutor, it was announced that Senator Bailey would withdraw his motion and would probably let Buchanan's temporary plea of not guilty stand.

Fire Caused Models to "Run."

New York, Jan. 21.—Scores of petty models were found running all over the place when firemen arrived to fight a blaze in the factory of Marcus Goldsmith in Brooklyn. The models were of wax for the factory was a model factory and the models are "stock." Fifty employees, 20 of whom were girls, fled to the street without hats or wraps. The building was entirely destroyed.
