Shea's Century

Iron Man, written by W. R. Burnett, author of Little Caesar, will be presented at Shea's Century starting Thursday. Heading the cast, in the title role, is Lew Ayres, he scores a hit on All Quiet on the Western Front and Doorway to Hell. Others in the cast are Jean Harlow, beautiful blonde of Hill's Angels and The Public Enemy and Robert Armstrong. Herb MacAnan at the grand organ and additional short subjects also will be presented.

Iron Man is said to be a powerful drama, and one which makes no concessions to situations or solutions which are typically movie. Strangely enough this story, taken from Burnett's popular novel is the love story of a man, but not a woman. Perhaps as such, it has great appeal to feminine audiences, although it deals with fights and fighters and rescues with the thud of punches in the squared arena. Tod Browning, one of Hollywood's best known directors, who was responsible for most of Lon Chaney's successes, directed Iron Man. Francis Edward Purugh, who received great credit for his work in preparing the adaptation and dialogue of Little Caesar, also wrote the script and dialogue for this story.

The Lafayette

Bill Boyd in Beyond Victory is now playing at the New Lafayette theatre. This is a brand-new treatment of the war theme. It has a great idea, sympathetically handled in an unpretentious production that, by its very simplicity, impresses. There is good entertainment for every one and an excellent plot for peace, without recourse to undue horror, without bias, and with the aid of Jimmie Gleason, whose lines and acting are a treat.

Four American soldiers are left in a town to cover up the bodies of their slain comrades. The main force is so far that the enemy will not be aware of any gap in the lines. As two of them meet death flashbacks tell the elaborate and accidental means by which they enlisted. The third man's history is told when he is reminded of his wife, a professional knife thrower, as a bullet clips his ear. And one learns the hero's story when he is called in the sold remaining member of the gallant party and begs him to mail a letter for him in case he is bumped off and the other comes through. However they both land in a German hospital and the hero's life is saved by a blood transfusion the blood donor being the German girl he had been engaged to before the prejudice of war separated them.

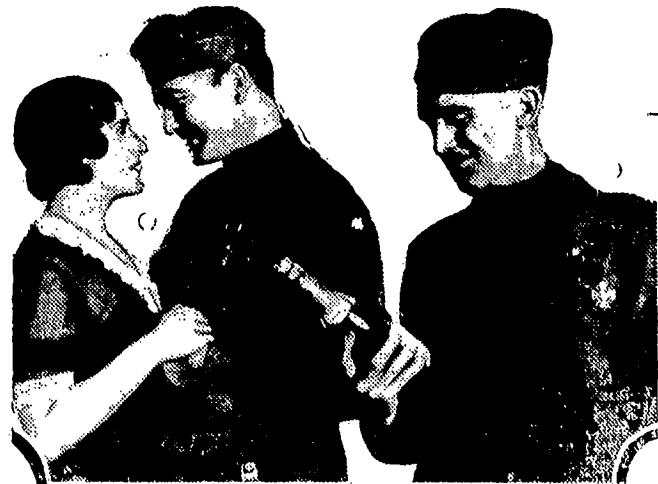
