OLYMPIC RACES TIMED WITH NOVEL TWO-EYED MOVIE CAMERA DEVICE

Photographs Runners at Tape but Times Them From Start—Aids in Close Decisions

A novel device for timing runners participating in athletic meets—a two-eyed motion picture camera, one eye of which photographs the runners at the finish of the race, while the other eye photographs the precise time they crossed the line—was used at the recent Olympic Games held in Los Angeles and proved of great assistance to the judges in arriving at their decisions.

The timer, a combination of a motion picture camera and an electrical clock, produces a strip of motion picture film at the rate of 128 frames per second, which shows the runners crossing the line and records the face of the clock at the time the photograph was taken with the mathematical accuracy of one-hundredth of a second. The scene at the line and the face of the clock indicating the time appear side by side on the film.

The device, known as the Kirby two-eyed camera, was developed by the Bell Telephone Laboratories for Electrical Research Products, Inc. under the sponsorship of Gustavus T. Kirby, member of the executive committee of the Olympic Games and of other prominent sports organizations. It had its introduction this spring at the Columbia-Syracuse and Princeton-Cornell track meets and was also used at the I.C.A.A.A.A. games at Berkeley, California, during July with marked success.

Mr. Kirby and other intercollegiate athletic officials strongly realized the need for a more accurate method of timing races several years ago when they looked at an ordinary motion picture record of the finish of an intercollegiate race and saw that second place had been won by a man who had been ignored by the judges. Kirby and others decided that the stop-watch method of timing runners was unfair and inaccurate. He worked on the idea and then turned the project over to the Bell scientists for completion.

The two-eyed camera offers three specific improvements over previous methods of timing: It provides a photographic record, eliminates human fallibility in judging, and times to within one-hundredth of a second instead of within one-tenth of a second.

Wires forming an electrical circuit connect the starter's pistol with the camera clock, so as soon as he pulls the trigger the impulse starts the clock. This obviates any lapse of time between the firing of the gun and the starting of the stop watch, as was possible under the old system. This lapse, it has been estimated, ranges from one-fifth to one-tenth of a second. In a 100-yard dash this means approximately that a runner is timed to a precision of four inches instead of more than a yard. The new camera clock is also a more accurate time keeper than the usual stop watch.

AERIAL PHOTO SURVEY MADE FOR CABLE ROUTE

To Extend Voice Links Through 190-Mile Stretch of Wild Northwest Country

One of the largest and most complete aerial photographic surveys ever made by a business organization was recently completed by Bell System engineers in charting the route for the newly-proposed Chicago-Minneapolis telephone cable line over a 190-mile stretch of exceedingly wild and rugged country between Neillsville and Baldwin, Wisconsin. To decide upon the shortest and most efficient route, photographs of a strip about two miles wide over this heavily wooded country, jotted with swamps, peat beds and the like were taken from an airplane flying at an altitude of some 13,000 feet, or two miles up in the sky.

Telephone engineers in charting a route through wooded sections of this kind usually have had to spend considerable time in making preliminary surveys, staking out a number of possible routes. But by using an airplane and making photographs the time formerly consumed was considerably reduced.

Flying two miles up with the camera, each photograph could not cover an area much larger than 1,300 feet to any degree of accuracy. Consequently in covering the strip two miles wide it was necessary to make two parallel trips along the route to gain complete and accurate coverage. Hundreds of photographs were taken. These photographs, of course were overlapping and in the final compilation of the map they had to be joined together with extreme care and accuracy.

Considering the relatively small cost of securing the aerial photographs and the many advantages over the former methods, Bell engineers believe the new method of survey will be used considerably in charting future cable routes.

SEVERAL ROADS BEING IMPROVED

This weeks condensed report on road conditions in this section issued by Chas. R. Waters, Buffalo district engineer for the State Public Works Department gives notice that Route 5, Main street east of Clarence in Erie county is being widened, but traffic is being maintained and motorists are urged to drive slowly. The Niagara Falls boulevard is being widened and reconstructed from North Tonawanda northerly for three miles toward Niagara Falls. Although traffic is being maintained, delays may be avoided by using the River road, route 384, between North Tonawanda and Niagara Falls. Other road conditions reported include:

ROUTE 16
The pavement from Machias southerly to Scotts Corners is being surface treated. One way traffic is maintained at point of operations.

ROUTE 74
The dirt road from Cutting to the Pennsylvania state line is being improved. Road closed.

ROUTE 242
The dirt road from Ashford Junction to Machias is being improved. Road is now closed.

CATTARAUGUS INDIAN RESERVATION
The Irving-Gowanda road is completed and open to traffic. The highway from Lewtens toward Versailles to Clear Creek is under construction. Detour via Plank road and Mile Strip road.

Should Order Cloth For Needy Now
Congressman James M. Mead has been informed by the American National Red Cross that local chapters desiring cloth for distribution to the needy should make application for the same promptly.

This cloth is being issued under the terms of a Joint Resolution approved by congress July 5, 1932, and thus far the Red Cross has ordered cotton cloth shipped to fill 20 requests from New York State and has approved requests for 435,000 yards of cloth. Application for cloth should be made by the Red Cross Chapter to the Area Manager on a special form provided by the organization and should cover the needs of all eligible relief agencies within the jurisdiction of the chapter allowing on an average of 20 yards of material per family.

The material furnished consists of gingham muslin outing flannel shirting etc; and is to be made into garments by the Chapter or other local relief organizations or may be distributed for production in the homes of those needing clothing. Each family to receive clothing is to be investigated by the Red Cross or relief agency and the extent of their need determined.
