**ITEMS OF INTEREST**

The county membership drive which began November 11 under auspices of Erie County American Legion will terminate with the visit of the national commander late in January, it was announced this week. The usual custom of awarding prize trips to the state and national conventions will be followed in the present program, it was stated. National convention headquarters has set a quota of 10,000 members for Erie County. The Lackawanna Post is seeking to aid at least 100 members to enroll during the drive which is under the direction of John J. Joyce, post commander.

Regular business meeting of the Ladies Aid Society of Our Mother of God Council church, Blasdell, was held Thursday evening in the church rectory. Mrs. Sam Palmer and Mrs. Ralph Palmer were hostesses of the social hour which followed the business meeting.

A card party held for the benefit of Our Mother of Good Council church Blasdell, in the home of Mrs. Joseph Gensler, Big Tree road Saturday evening proved both a social and financial success. A good crowd also attended a benefit party for the Ladies Aid fund held Sunday evening in the home of Mrs. F. Muller of Willett road.

Members of the county rifle and pistol team committee of Erie County American Legion plan to visit posts which are not active in target work according to Chairman Paul A. Shepherd of the committee. At present seven posts are engaged in rifle practice. Intensive practice in preparation for the coming county and state competitions is urged.

An attack of conscience suffered after he had stolen several chickens from a neighbor at Compton, Cal., landed Wong Hook, the alleged thief in jail, according to a news report from that city. Wong was caught when he went to return the chickens by his neighbor who had been laying in wait for the thief to attempt a repetition of his crime as often happens in such cases. The judge held that restitution failed to right a wrong and sent the defendant to jail for 30 days.

A net savings of \$100,000,000 a year in naval appropriations was held feasible by Representative Carl Vinson, chairman of the House Naval Affairs committee after a recess conference with President Herbert Hoover. The major opportunities for saving, according to Mr. Vinson, include the reduction of appropriations

for new construction and replacements to \$30,000,000 a year, consolidation of bureaus and divisions, the creation of a central purchasing agency for the War and Navy departments and the elimination of obsolete or superfluous shore stations and flying fields.

Budget Director Mark Graves has submitted to Acting Gov. Herbert Lehman figures to show that the net overhead cost of state government in all its branches is only \$30,000,000, or about one-tenth of the total budget for 1932. This is the overhead cost of all administrative offices, the 17 states departments, the Legislature, the courts and the governor's office. The remainder of the \$300,000,000 budget is composed of state aid items and extensive government services added by laws in recent years.

Comprehensive plans for reorganizing the Republican party with a view of overcoming the effects of the recent defeat at the polls and to getting ready for the 1934 and 1936 campaigns are under serious discussion among Republican leaders, according to the latest announcements from Washington. Along with efforts to present a program which will appeal to the farmers the Republicans will stand for economic in government aimed at reduction of taxes.

A shakeup of the Federal Farm board and drastic changes in its functions are planned by Washington representatives of leading agriculture organizations who are busy now lining up support in the two houses of Congress, according to statements from the Capitol city. It is expected the drive will be to reduce the present membership of the board from seven to five and to recind its present attempt at price stabilization.

Action on a proposed merger of the New York State Council of Churches and the New York State Council of Religious Education will be taken at a meeting in Albany January 19. A merger would be in line with the spirit of the times, Dr. W. G. Landes, secretary of the first named group, stated recently.

The chief obstacle to the return of prosperity to the people of the United States, and the one which may be most quickly removed by prompt and intelligent action at Washington, is that due to the so called misgovernment war debts, it was recently stated by Dr. M. M. Butler, president of Columbia U.

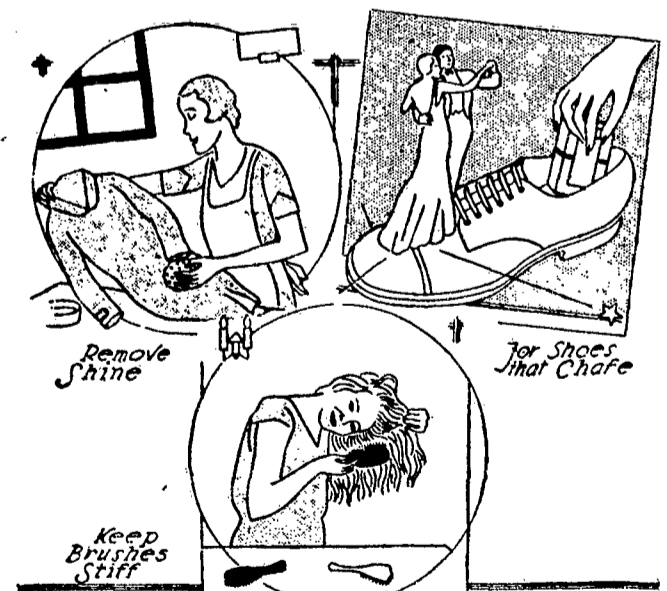

**Things You Never Knew That Soap Would Do**



**Remove the Shine from Clothing**  
To remove the shine from clothing, make a thick paste by dissolving half a small cake of Ivory soap shaved fine (or 2 oz. Ivory Flakes) in a quart of water. Then sponge the clothing with this paste, using a wooden cloth. Sponge again with clear water. Place a clean cloth over clothing and press with hot iron while still damp.

**Keep Shoes from Chafing Feet**  
To keep shoes from chafing the feet, rub the stockings or socks with dry Ivory soap—in other words lubricate them. Also moisten a piece of Ivory soap and rub it thoroughly over the inside lining of the shoes, especially where the toes and heel touch. Also rub Ivory soap on the parts of the feet where the shoes chafe.

**Keep Brushes Stiff**  
To keep brushes stiff and in good condition, wet the brush in a solution of about one teaspoon of ammonia and one and a half pints of water. Then soap the brush well with Ivory soap, rubbing it lightly with the hands. Rinse several times in the ammonia solution and dry in sun or near a hot radiator, standing the brush on its bristles.
