The Erlanger

Tuesdays night's performance will be omitted on account of the Fire Chief broadcast. This will be given at 9:30 P. M. from the stage of the Erlanger and will last a half hour only. Under a first come, first served plan, all seats will be sold for \$1. None will be reserved. The broadcast receipts will be donated to the Mayor's Committee on Unemployment relief.

To compensate the loss of the Tuesday night performance of The Laugh Parade, an extra matinee will be played on Friday in addition to the Wednesday and Saturday afternoon performances. Seats for the three matinees will be scaled from \$1.10 to \$2.75, tax included. Night prices, \$1.10 to \$3.30, tax included. Beginning Monday January 23 the Erlanger box office will be open daily from 9 A. M. to 9 P. M. for advance sale of seats. Mail orders will be promptly filled when accompanied by remittance and addressed, stamped envelope.

Wynn has several new inventions in The Laugh Parade and the usual trick hats, over-size pants and other grotesque antics that are always a part of an Ed. Wynn performance. He runs a Punch and Judy show; tends bar in a speakeasy; leads the orchestra and tries his hand at a series of impersonations ranging from a juggler of the gay nineties to the Hunchback of Notre Dame.
