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## Alfonse Pulkowski to Head Charity Drive Raise \$5000 Fund this Year

Alfonse L. Pulkowski, cashier of the American Bank, who was selected to head the annual drive of the Lackawanna Charity Organization, at a meeting of that body last Thursday, has announced that the drive this year will be for a \$5,000 quota instead of the 1932 quota of \$4,000.

Assisting committees and co-workers will be announced following the annual meeting and election at Community House at 3:30 Thursday afternoon.

The drive will open today (Thursday) and will continue until November 19, during which time every household and business man will be given an opportunity to help their more unfortunate fellow citizens.

With the constantly increasing need of milk for undernourished children in mind, Mr. Pulkowski announces an innovation to the usual program this year.

Co-operating with the Charity Organization society in its drive to build a milk fund, dairy owners of the city have signified their intention to assist by distributing milk bottles with special tops, receptacles for milk fund donations. They will be placed in every business house in the city, the collection to go for milk for the needy of the city.

## SPANISH AMERICAN CITIZENS TO DANCE

The Spanish American Citizens, an entirely new organized body of Spanish birth or descent, will present an united front for political preferment in the future. And, to inaugurate the formation, will hold a dance at the Spanish hall, Ridge Road and Gates avenue, Saturday evening October 21.

Divorced entirely from the older organization of Spanish origin, this new body will make a study of politics and give its support as the study dictates.

## WILBER AND FAHEY FREED IN DEATH CASE

Supreme Court Justice George A. Larkin, in Supreme Court, Friday, ordered the release of Lazelle Wilber, 29, 338 Center Street and Theodore Fahey, 29, 418 Monroe Street, accused of fatally beating John Higgins, 115 Sand Street, last September.

Justice Larkin's action followed an argument presented by Samuel M. Fleischman, defense attorney that insufficient evidence had been presented to hold the two men.

Fleischman applied for writ of habeas corpus which would prevent the District Attorney from presenting evidence against the two men to the October grand jury.

Wilber and Fahey were held by Judge Pillion following an inquest in the death of Higgins, but Justice Larkin's decision over rules the local court and the case is closed unless additional evidence is forth coming.
