Milk Dealers Act to Clean Up "Milk Bottle Racket"

A crimp was put in the milk bottle racket, which has cost dealers serving this city several thousand dollars in the past few months, at a meeting of the dealers concerned this afternoon.

The meeting was held in the office of L. D. Spjak, local supervisor of the Department of Agriculture and Markets and was attended by representatives of every dairy distributing in this city.

After thoroughly discussing the ramifications of the racket, it was decided to enforce the three cent bottle deposit endorsed by the State Board of Milk Control.

"For several months," said one dealer, "I have been buying my property. Not because I thought it just, but because I realized that my store distributor had been victimized."

The racket was a petty one, but it offered a few cents spending money for children, yes and adults. It worked this way: The dealer would deliver the milk, the empty bottle taken to a community and the dealer received...

There was no way to check the cost and income of bottles but this system will be changed after January 2.

On, and after, that date all purchases of milk will pay a deposit of three cents a bottle and, in return, be given a ticket which must be returned with the empty bottle for a refund.

These tickets will not be interchangeable but will be returned by each individual milk dealer.

MAY BE DITCHED

Only \$37,000 stands between the city receiving the benefit of a \$200,000 improvement on South Park Avenue. The widening of that thoroughfare from the North City line to Ridge Road, which was on the CWA projects program, going by the board through the failure of the city to borrow from the Federal government.

Under the plan, the city must pay for all material, a matter of \$37,000. But, at present, the treasury would not stand the drain.

An effort, however, will be made to secure funds for the improvement from a local bank.

PROJECT GIVES WORK TO 400

Straightening of the North branch of Smoke's Creek, from the Abbott Road to South Park Avenue, a CWA project which started today, opened up employment to nearly 400 men.

Plans, as approved by City engineer Timothy McCormick, will eliminate the present snake-like course of the stream and it will flow in a straight line following the conclusion of the project.

Approximately 80,000 yards of material will be moved, and it is estimated it will take about a year to complete the project.

The Federal government assumes all labor costs, but the city has to supply tools for the laborers.

BANKS TO CHARGE FOR SERVICES

Banks throughout Erie County will make a charge for every service they render.

Member banks of the Buffalo Clearing House Association all announce the installation of the new plan commencing with the New Year.

A charge of \$1 a month will be made on all checking accounts which fall below \$100. Ten checks written against the account without additional charge. All checks over will be charged at five cents apiece plus a two cents Federal check.

The Federal tax applies to all checks written.

MEAD FAVORS LOW LIQUOR TAX

Representative Jas. M. Mead, one of the oldest wets in Congress and always a bitter foe of prohibition, has joined the ranks of the liberals who believe in a moderate tax as applied to beer, wines and whiskies.

"The cost of crime in the U. S. reaches the huge total of thirteen thousand million dollars annually," said Congressman Mead and in order that we might diminish this staggering total, I favor a moderate scale of taxation which will permit the masses to buy good, wholesome drinks at reasonable cost.

Our country not only needs 5c cigars, as Tommy Marshall would say, but we also require a 5c glass of beer, and spirituous liquors at a price not exceed \$1.50 per quart. Unless we are reasonable, particularly for the next year or two, in the passage of tax laws, we are going to defeat the purpose of the repeal and permit a continuation of the illicit beverage industry that has been thriving under prohibition for 13 years.

beer and the proposed tax of \$2.00 on liquors, are too high and not only diminish the production and consumption of good, wholesome beverages but it also reduces the total of revenues which under a more liberal system would accrue to the Government.
