where people can go for direct information, support, counseling and training. We now can offer that here in Edmeston.

The International Information Center is named in memory of Jack Kennedy and Jimmy Willis, both caring and supportive grandfathers of Andrew Kennedy, a resident of Pathfinder Village. The center contains a Library and Tele-Computing Media Center, the Clark Lecture Hall, (a 46-seat multi-media equipped auditorium), the Zimmerman Meeting Room (designed to accommodate

up to 50 participants or multiple smaller groups), counseling rooms, and staff and administrative offices. The exterior design of the center is Greek Revival, consistent with the colonial style of the Pathfinder Village campus. The interior emphasizes natural light through the inclusion of 24 skylights to create a comfortable, friendly and positive ambiance throughout the center.

The Opening Ceremony, scheduled at 2 p.m. on Saturday, Oct. 5, will include remarks by Marian G. Mullet, president and chief executive officer, Pathfinder Village; William F. Streck, MD, chairman, board of directors, Pathfinder Village Inc., also president and chief executive officer of Bassett Healthcare, Jane Forbes Clark, chairman, Clark Estates Inc.; Edward W. Stack, president, Clark Estates Inc.; Elizabeth M. Maloney, member of the Board of Trustees, Pathfinder Village Foundation Inc.; Joyce W. Moreland/ John R.

Kennedy, Center Naming Benefactors and Rajendra K. Saboo, chairman of the Trustees, Rotary Foundation, past president Rotary International.

Saboo represents over a decade of active support by the Rotary Clubs in Pathfinder Village's neighboring areas (Rotary District 7170) in the development and enhancement of the life and learning opportunities for the residents of Pathfinder Village. Pathfinder Village is an independent not-for-profit organization sustained through the generosity of individuals and philanthropic foundations dedicated to ensuring that "each life may find meaning."

**COOPERSTOWN** - Lucy Nell Bailey, 101, of Cooperstown and formerly of the Hillcrest area of Binghamton, died early Sunday morning, Sept. 29, 1996 at The Meadows.
