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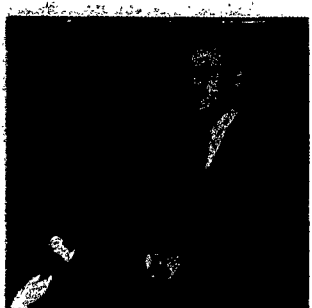

Jordan wins DA race in landslide

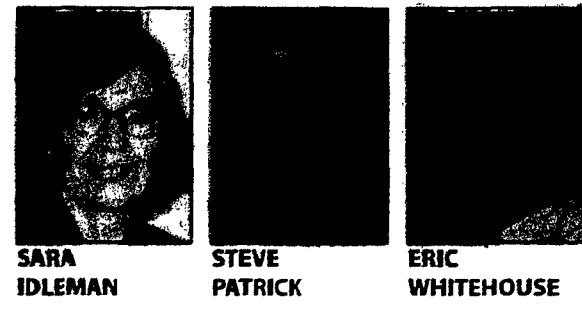
Will vacate assembly seat, forcing special election next year

GREENWICH—Tony Jordan decisively beat out incumbent district attorney Kevin Kortright by a two-to-one margin, following what became the one of the hardest-fought and closely followed campaigns in the Capital District, heavy on the mudslinging.
"This is a great night for us," Jordan said late Tuesday at his campaign headquarters at the Greenwich VFW as TV cameras rolled. Family, including wife Wendy Jordan, friends and supporters packed the hall, offering Jordan congratulations and back slaps. Jordan received 7,707 votes to Kortright's 3,615 votes.

Idleman, Patrick, Whitehouse returned

GREENWICH—The town of Greenwich will have an unchanged board after all three incumbents won their races Tuesday. Sara Idleman will go into a third term as Democrat supervisor after beating out challenger Robert Jeffords, who will still have a seat on the board as a sitting town council member with two years left on his term. Idleman got 796 votes to Jeffords' 667.
"We had an amazing campaign," Idleman said late Tuesday, as she waited for results.
"I'd like to have more time on the board. I have things I want to accomplish," she said.
Republican council members Steve Patrick and Eric Whitehouse also won reelection convincingly, beating out challengers Nancy Fitzpatrick and Susan Frisbee.
Patrick will get a sixth four-year term; Whitehouse a third term.
Patrick got 895 votes. Whitehouse 840, Frisbee 809.

Pitts withstands Salem supervisor challenge

SALEM—Last night Salem saw the fullest election docket in Washington County, with the positions of town supervisor, justice, clerk, and two council positions all contested.
Of special note was the race for town supervisor, between incumbent Seth Pitts and challenger Jay Bellanca. Pitts won with 523 votes to Bellanca's 220.

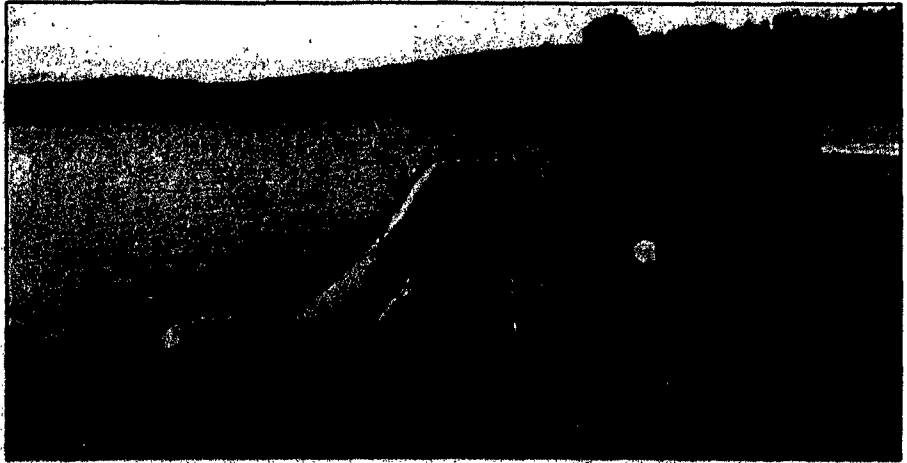

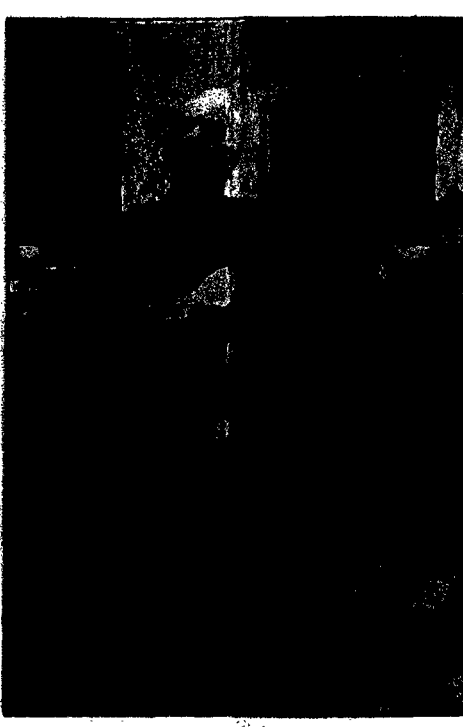
Jennings, McLoughlin retain Saratoga seats

SCHUYLERVILLE—Town of Saratoga elections in Schuylerville centered around the race for two open town council positions with three candidates. Incumbents Jim Jennings (Honest Democrat) and Mike McLoughlin (Conservative, Republican, Independent) defended and newcomer Dan McCabe (Conservative, Republican, Independent) contested.
With Republican primaries forgone when candidate Jim Jennings submitted incorrectly signed petition papers to the County Board of Elections, the race was off to a rocky start. In the end, Jennings prevailed with 685 votes, whilst running on the Democrat and Honest Party tickets, coming in second to incumbent Mike McLoughlin, who had 809 votes, and beating McCabe, who came in with 569 votes.

Equipped for quick rescues

During the drill, two firefighters — John Stewart and Joe Dileo — fake a drowning, and William Lant and Jason Fedler deploy the craft. Chief Pat Donahue tells the Journal Press that the raft blows up in a minute and features an open bow, making it easier and safer for crews to perform rescues on ice. The fire company raised \$7,000 through donations to pay for the craft and its equipment.

New verse: Bob Warren releases 'Poet in Me' with coffeehouse feel

Album debuts to sold-out cafe show, online streaming audience

GREENWICH—Bob Warren's "The Poet in Me" was released this past Saturday with a sellout show at Caffe Lena in Saratoga. The show was also streamed online at Concert Window, an online music venue site, which drew over 40 viewers from around the world.
"The Poet in Me" is Warren's sixth album and features eleven tracks of varying musical styles.
Warren's band is comprised of bassist Tony Markellis, drummer Danny Whelchel, guitarist Don Warren, Cellist Monica Roach, keyboardist Matt Donnelly, and singer Joy MacKenzie, with whom Warren is now working on another album.
The band recorded "The Poet in Me" on March 2-3 at Edle Road Studios in Greenwich. This is Warren's first album which doesn't add additional musicians or instrumentation post recording, giving the album a unique live, coffeehouse feel.
The intention was to provide a "true reflection of the band and the songs during this time."
"We recorded at Edle Road, and they have a space big enough to have everyone play," Warren explained. Edle Road Studios is comprised of several recording rooms which allows a band to play simultaneously, as opposed to relying on layering, where one instrument is recorded at a time, and then
