CHOLERA.—We learn this morning of the death of Mr. James H. Patterson, formerly Accomptant to the Corporation. He had been in a poor state of health for many months past, and had labored under chronic dysentery, in addition to which he had a severe attack of erysipelas...

TWO MORE VICTIMS.—John Mullin, of Marshall street, was seized on Monday with the usual symptoms of the epidemic. Medical aid was called in, but without any beneficial result; he grew gradually worse, and at 8 o'clock last night resigned his breath into the hands of Him who gave it.

A young man named Charles Brady also died of the prevailing disease last night, after a few hours illness. Medicine was useless—the flat had gone forth, and he had numbered the days allotted to him! The insatiable archer had marked him for his own.

THE name of the lady who died yesterday in one of the East Brooklyn Omnibuses, was Davison, and is supposed to be a mother of Dr. Davison of the village of Hempstead, L. I. She resided in the city of New York, on 3d avenue near Harlem.

LOST CHILD.—A girl about ten years of age, who gave her name as Maria Nancy, was picked up in the street by Mr. Parsons, and taken to the overseers of the Poor, who sent her to the Poor-house at Flatbush.

ALARM OF MURDER.—As watchman Lacy was going his rounds in Smith street, last night, he heard repeated cries of "murder!" from the house of one John Riley. Hastening to the spot, he found the said Riley beating his wife in an unmerciful manner, and he accordingly took him into custody.
