Priest - Editor Lashes Out At Church Establishment

Huntington, Ind. — The editor of the nation's largest Catholic weekly, Father Albert J. Nevins of "Our Sunday Visitor," has made a strong attack on the Catholic educational establishment, declaring that the crisis facing Catholic schools today is not one of money but rather the loss of confidence by a substantial number of Catholic parents "in the insidious and closed establishment that has developed since Vatican II."

humanism of the public school, it has lost its reason for existence." Pointing out that the press has given the impression that the crisis of Catholic education is financial, Father Nevins disagrees. "The real problem," he writes, "is that too many Catholic parents have lost confidence in it." He adds that Catholic parents "do not send their children to Catholic schools to have them confused in their Faith, to be made doubtful of its doctrines, to be convinced that there is little difference between various Christian denominations."

 SAN DIEGO (AP) — The purse-snatching elephants at San Diego Zoo are in for a shock if they try their old tricks again.

"A few of the elephants had been maneuvering their front legs into the moat surrounding their enclosure, resting their heads on the wall and dangling their trunks under or over the outside fences at viewers," said head mammal keeper George Gillespie.
