PRALL TRIES TO FORCE SCHOOL PAY INCREASE

When Craig Balks, Education President Asks Corporation Counsel's Aid

Atting S. Prall, president of the Board of Education, has requested Mayor Hyman to direct Corporation Counsel John O'Brien to take legal steps toward compelling Comptroller Craig to pay salaries to the educational forces of the city under the new schedules. The Comptroller has notified the Board of Education that he will not make these payments unless the payroll is reduced to the rate that were in effect prior to the enactment of the new teachers' salary law.

COX MANAGER QUIZZED TODAY

E. H. Moore Expected as Final Witness at Present Session of Senate Committee

Chicago, Sept. 2.—E. H. Moore, of Youngstown, Ohio, Governor Cox's manager at the San Francisco convention, was expected here today as the final witness at the present session of the Senate committee investigating campaign funds.

The committee also hopes to learn today who is paying for distribution in plate form to newspapers of a fiction story, "The Sam of Freedom Ridge," containing an argument for the League of Nations. News dispatches received here quoted Senator Pat Harrison, head of the Democratic Speakers' Bureau, as saying that Bernard M. Baruch had sent up \$12,000 to pay for distribution of this story as democratic propaganda.

The possibility of the election being put off by the courts and out of constitutional provisions that a candidate must have a majority in the electoral college would be discussed after the election has occurred, that the Tennessee constitution was illegal and women's votes cast under authority of the 19th amendment also would be discussed.

Postal Clerks Ousted

Chicago, Sept. 2.—Pierce F. Butler, president of the postal clerks' union, and ten other postal employees were discharged from their jobs today by order of Postmaster General Burdick.

Shot By Masked Man

A masked man entered the home of Tom Capolano, a recently returned Italian, and shot him early today and fatally wounded him as he lay asleep. This was the latest in a long series of Italian murders in Brooklyn where there has been no apparent police protection.

SUFFRAGISTS SURE CONN. WILL RATIFY

Hartford, Conn., Sept. 2.—Suffrage workers in this state today predicted that the Connecticut Legislature would ratify the 19th amendment at the special session starting Sept. 14 and thus keep it in the constitution, despite Tennessee's withdrawal of its ratification.

The legislature is decidedly in favor of the measure, said Katharine Ludington, president of the state suffrage association. "Many members have expressed eagerness at the delay in calling the special session. Of course we are not satisfied with the delay in Tennessee. The amendment has been passed and proclaimed by the Secretary of state and cannot be rescinded.

The September 14 session was not technically called to consider ratification of the 19th amendment. When Governor Holcomb issued his proclamation, Tennessee's action was regarded as final according to his proclamation. The special session is to consider measures to legalize holding and registration of women voters.

Washington, Sept. 2.—(United Press)—The possibility of the Tennessee suffrage tangle dragging out the Fall election through the courts was being considered by high government officials today.
