HOW TO REMOVE TARNISH FROM COPPER

The tarnish on copper, brass, and bronze is copper carbonate. It may be removed by friction, dissolved in weak acids. Rubbing with oil is a common expedient on these metals. This cleaner has been applied to the metal in water, dry with a soft cloth. A final rubbing with dry cotton-wool or whiting will give the metal an even brighter finish.

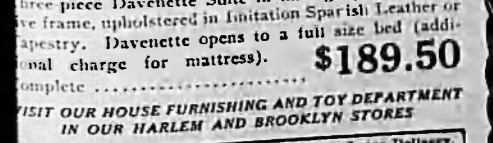

PHONE COMPANY EXPLAINS RATE INCREASE ASKED

Under the proposed new telephone rates which have been proposed to the Public Service Commission by the New York Telephone Company, there will be no change in the charges for calls from public telephones to points within the city, according to a statement given out by J. S. McCulloh, vice-president.

Under the new toll schedules for New York City there will be no change in the charges for calls from public telephones to points within the city. The boundaries and scope of service in the telephone area will remain as at present, the official announced. These rate zones were established in 1915 by order of the Public Service Commission, Second District.

If the rates proposed are approved and adopted, it is planned that rate business service will be eliminated in all zones. Flat rate residence service will be discontinued in several zones and where about 50 cents per month higher than at present. Only such intracity toll calls as involve the longer hauls are subject to increased rates.

Mr. McCulloh said the present annual term of service will be eliminated and all service will be on a monthly basis. This monthly contract method will make possible extensive economies in accounting practice with resultant savings to the public and will produce simpler billing methods.

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
