Sixty Stores, Shops Close Tomorrow For 3-Hour Good Friday Observance

Cooperating with Greece churches in the interest of the observance of Good Friday, 60 stores, shops and business offices in the town will be closed tomorrow from noon to 3 p. m.

Members of eleven of the town's Protestant churches will join forces for union services at Bethany Presbyterian Church, starting at noon.

The three-hour closing of business places also will provide town residents with the additional opportunity to worship at the town's four Roman Catholic churches.

The Good Friday business shutdown was inaugurated several

years ago, largely through the efforts of the Rev. Albert B. Wangman, of Bethany Presbyterian Church.

Contest papers must be signed with complete address listed—and mailed to the "Know Your Town", Editor, 163 Willowbrook Road, Rochester 16. No papers for the current phase of the contest will be accepted after the morning mail delivery next Monday—March 30.

The names of the winners and those meriting honorable mention will be published in the April 2 issue of The Greater Greece Press.

All Around the Town . . .

In cooperation with the Youth Services Council, the Greece Recreation Department is preparing a list of summer activities available to youngsters of the town, according to William J. Bub, Jr., town recreation superintendent. All organizations sponsoring youth projects have been asked to fill out forms, supplying information about their own programs.

Members of Sea Explorer Unit 301 of the Boy Scouts of America will conduct a signaling demonstration at Northgate Plaza tomorrow afternoon to stimulate interest in the annual Scout-O-Rama, which will be held at the War Memorial on April 10 and 11.

The Town Council recently received the following letter from G. Richard Sutherland, senior public health engineer of the Monroe County Department of Health:

All Greece councilmen in the past have been elected at large. They will be elected under the ward system in November.

The two councilmen-at-large under the proposed legislation would be in addition to the four representing the town wards.

Members of the Parent Discussion Group of Charlotte High School will discuss "Are Students of Charlotte High Using Their Time to Their Best Advantage?" and "What is the Purpose of Education?" at a meeting April 9 at 7:45 p. m. at the school.

A meeting to organize an adult softball league for Greece residents will be held April 14 at 8 p. m. in the recreation department offices at the Town Hall. League play is expected to get underway in May.

The girls, Mary Ann Little, 7, of 33 Beaumont Road, and Mary DiCesare, 12, of 77 Dalston Road, were taken to Northside Hospital in the Barnard ambulance. On the way to the hospital, the ambulance was involved in an accident on Veterans Memorial Bridge and a National Ambulance was called to take the girls the rest of the way. About three hours after the accident occurred Mary Ann Little died. The DiCesare girl suffered a skull fracture and a fractured leg. According to witnesses, the girls ran from the south curb into

the path of the car. The accident is still under investigation.

Officers Algrid Zemaitis and Edward Hess checked a call at 80 Versetree Drive where Colin Holt, 8, had suffered minor bruises and lacerations while playing in his yard. Colin slid into the back of a car parked in the driveway. He was taken to Northside Hospital in the Greece Volunteer ambulance.
