Services Held For 2 Victims Of Accident

Funeral rites were held here Tuesday for two youthful Newark truckmen who met death in a highway accident in North Carolina last Thursday night, June 12. They were Edward Huntley, 23, of 113 Dell St., and Dominic Vitaro, 30, of 229 West Sherman Ave., who with a Florida man were killed when their truck overturned in a roadside pond in the night.

The pair had left Newark on June 2 and were hauling produce from southern states to New York City and Philadelphia. Huntley's brother, Charles, was also working with them in North Carolina and came along in a car shortly after the accident occurred.

He said they had left a bowling hall at Atlantic Beach about 11:40 p. m., traveling in the cab of the truck's tractor without the trailer North Carolina state police who investigated, told Huntley that they believed the driver had been blinded by oncoming lights or forced off the road on a curve and, after going along the shoulder about 25 feet, the truck slipped down a 6-foot bank and overturned in four feet of water in Bogue Sound near Moorehead City.

Charles Huntley aided in extracting the victims, but all were dead when rescued. Huntley had died of internal injuries. Vitaro was drowned, and Douglas Bean, 24, of Winter Garden, Fla., had died of a fractured neck, post-mortem examinations revealed. It was not known which of the men was driving nor was the identity of the oncoming car obtained.

Edward Huntley was born in Newark, the son of Mrs. Emma Huntley, who survives, and the late Bert Huntley. Also surviving are his wife, Jane Clark Huntley; a 3-year old son, Edward, Jr.; two sisters, Mrs. Bertha Dobbelaere and Mrs. Marie Ring, Newark; and two brothers, Bernard and Charles Huntley, Newark.

Vitaro was born in Italy in 1910, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Vitaro, with whom he lived here and who survive. He is also survived by his wife, Theresa, and one brother, Ralph, service Vitaro of Newark. Funeral services for both men were held in St. Michael's Church Tuesday morning and both were buried in Willow Avenue Cemetery.
