Branch Office For Convenience of Motorists

The decision of the Steuben County Board of Supervisors last week to authorize the establishment of branch county clerk's offices in the cities of Hornell and Corning for the issuance of automobile registrations and plates seems to have solved, temporarily at least, a knotty problem.

The Board by this action makes it possible for motorists who reside near these two cities to obtain their plates without taking a troublesome journey to the county clerk's office in this village. The branch offices are to be put into operation for a period of one year, and an appropriation of \$4,000 was made to cover cost of the project. If the arrangement proves satisfactory the branches may be continued.—Bath Courier.

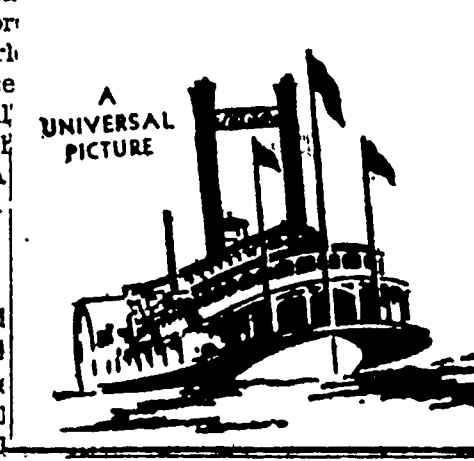
Low Bidder
