Sonne. To earn a College Entrance Diploma a pupil must pass the prescribed Regents examinations for the four year course with an average of not less than 75 per cent. The College Entrance Diploma is issued in three grades: (1) A diploma based on a minimum passing mark in each subject of 65 per cent and an average of 75 per cent. (2) A diploma with credit will be issued if the average is 85 per cent to 89 per cent. (3) A diploma with honor will be issued if the average is 90 per cent or above.
