

Half of Kinney's Business Come From Farmers

It is generally agreed that Gouverneur is dependent upon dairymen and their families for much of its vigor as a business center and its economic well being.

Many businesses are almost wholly dependent upon dairymen, the farm supply stores, etc. This is obvious, but it is surprising to note that farmers and their families represent about half the sales of stores like B.O. Kinney, Inc.

Friday is generally considered "farmer's day" in town and Kinney's two modern drug stores in Gouverneur find farm trade especially heavy at this time. Farm folks enjoy coming to town to shop, attend the movies and, perhaps, do a little visiting at Jones Farm Supply and some of the other stores.

Many of them, like the Spragueville couple that visited the store about noon, purchased One Cent Sale merchandise. A dairyman from Fine stopped in about midday to have a prescription filled. He also bought rubbing alcohol and Carbulated Petrolatum for veterinary use.

Still other farms visited the cigar counter for tobacco and the latest newspaper. One of the favorite departments with farm families is Kinney's candy section where chocolate bars and Russell Shover and Fanny Farmer boxed candies are popular.

The fountain is open from 8 a.m. until 9 p.m. daily, and farm families frequent it for lunches and hot coffee and soda "breaks" throughout the day and evening.

Farm housewives and daughters are among the best customers of Kinney's large cosmetic department which served about 160 persons last Friday. Many rely on Harry Farden's watch repair services, too.

As we draw closer to Christmas, farm folks will buy and lay-away about half the toys and Christmas cards sold from Kinney's big stocks.
