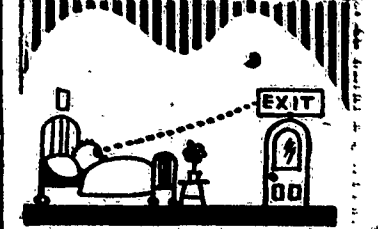

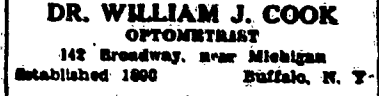

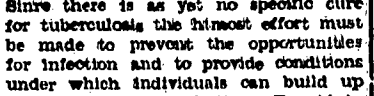
## A BATTLE HALF WON

**A Statement For the Opening of the 26th Annual Sale of Xmas Seals on Nov. 25th.**

While the state may justly feel proud of what has already been accomplished in the control of tuberculosis, there is still cause for grave concern and energetic effort. The battle is still only half won. Probably 45,000 men, women and children in the state are today suffering from tuberculosis. Deaths from this cause still occur in large proportion during early adult life, the productive period when the state's investment in the individual is high, with returns just beginning, when the children are still young and suffer the greatest loss, when there has usually been a long period of disability, and when, if the afflicted is the wage-earner of the family, his death means another burden for charity.

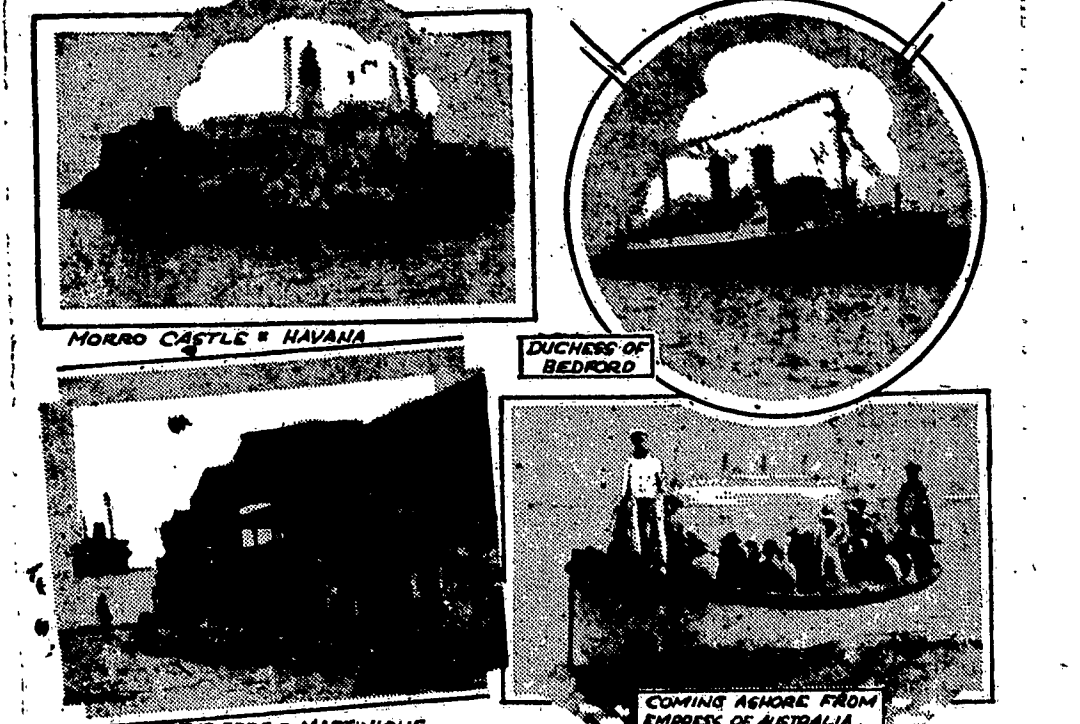
The fight will have to go on along the same lines as in the recent past. Since there is as yet no specific cure for tuberculosis the utmost effort must be made to prevent the opportunities for infection and to provide conditions under which individuals can build up resistance against infection. To aid in carrying on this work of prevention even more effectively, along with even more adequate care of those already afflicted, is the worthy purpose served by Christmas seals.

The sale of seals in New York State (outside of New York City) is carried on by 62 county or city associations under the leadership of executive members of the State committee.

As one experienced traveler says: "Why remain at home, provided the bank account will cover \$10 per day on such a ship as the Duchess of Bedford, 30,000 gross tons, which leaves New York Jan. 7 and Feb. 8, 1933, and visits 13 ports not counting New York, with the unequalled skyline and its thousands of attractions? And New York," he adds, "going away and coming back! Two bites at a cherry!"

On both voyages of the Duchess to the sunny Caribbean, one sees beautiful Hamilton, Bermuda, where jaywalkers are safe because there are no automobiles; then Encls Sam's Bay, St. Pierre, Martinique, where historic and devastating Mount Pelée is now quiescent; and Fort de France, Martinique's quaint capital; next Bridgetown, Barbados; then Trinidad with its famous asphalt Fitch Lake, and Port of Spain.
